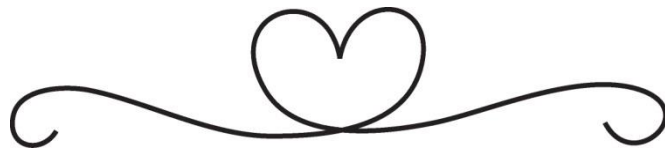


POETRY UNIT

Teacher notes:

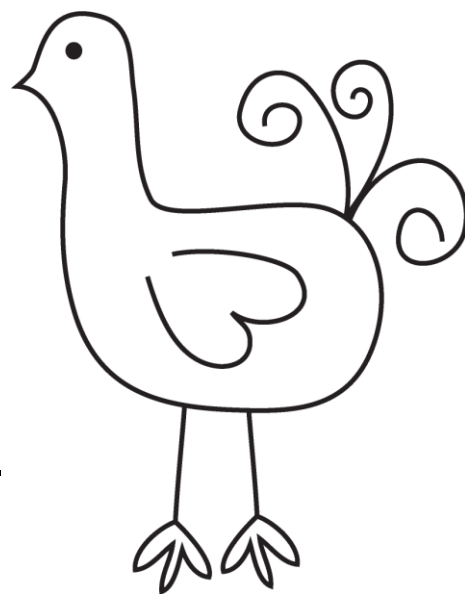


I created this unit because I wanted a poetry unit that would be a fun and exciting learning experience for students, but also teacher and student friendly. There are a total of 19 poem templates that can be covered in a 1-3 week time frame, depending on how long you want to spend on each type of poem. I usually pick one poem a day to have my first graders learn and write. At the end of our poetry unit the students color one of the cover pages. Then, I staple all the poems they have written throughout the weeks into their own poetry journal booklet!

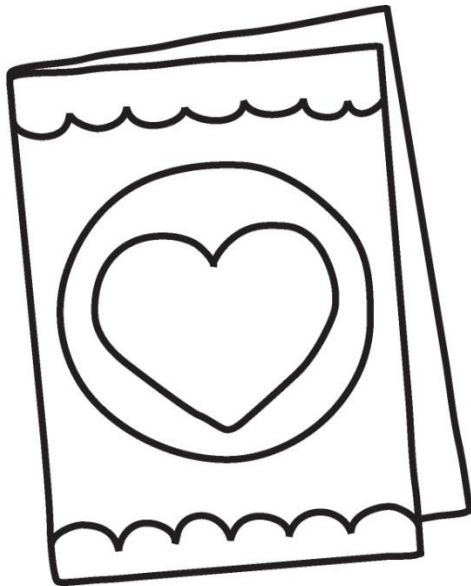

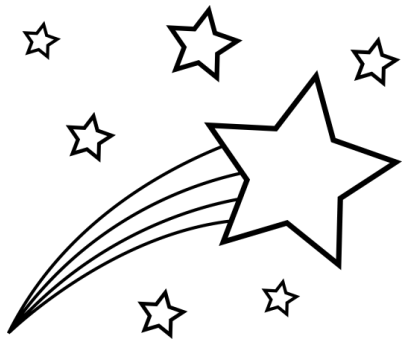

I wish Cinderella was my friend.

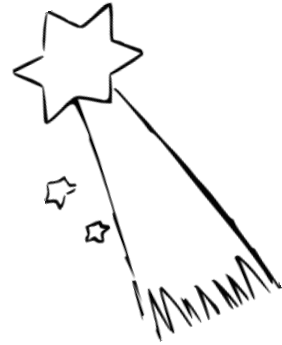

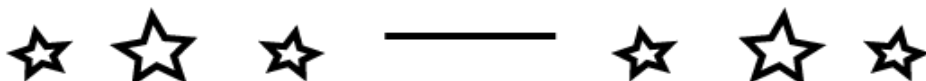

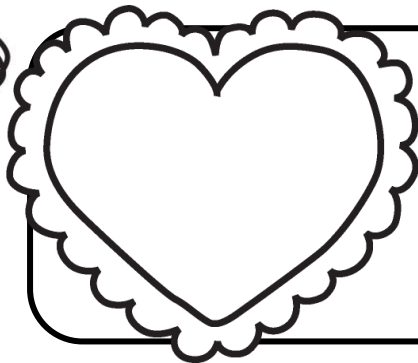

Color Poem



A Shape Poem is a poem that describes an object, and is shaped like the object it describes.

EXAMPLE:

A Raindrop

A little, wet drop of water
Splashing and crashing
Everyone runs for cover



SHAPE POEM

Important Poem

An Important Poem consists of important details about a particular topic. It ends with the most important detail about that topic.

Example:

Important Poem

The important thing about me
is I am a mother.

I am patient,
and I am kind,
and I care.

But the most important thing
about me is I love my children
with all my heart.



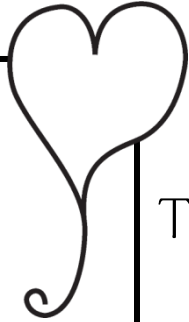



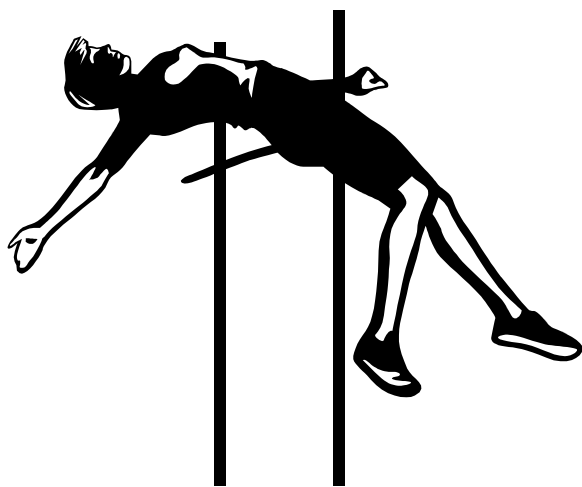

Acrostic Poem

An Acrostic poem uses the letters in a topic word to begin each of the lines of the poem. All lines should be connected to the topic.

Highest jumper on the team

Never has a bad attitude

Nice to everyone

Yes! He's a great kid!

Adjective Poem

In an Adjective poem a topic is described using adjectives.

An adjective poem can be really silly!

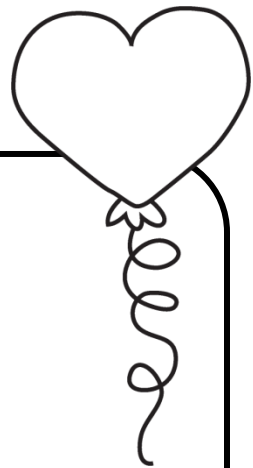

Who, what, when, where, why poems should be five lines long. The poem tells a story or gives a strong picture of someone or something. Each line should answer one of the “w” questions. When you read the poem it should sound like two sentences put together.

EXAMPLE:

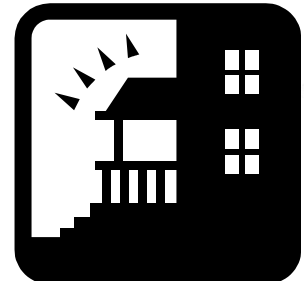
WHO: The old man

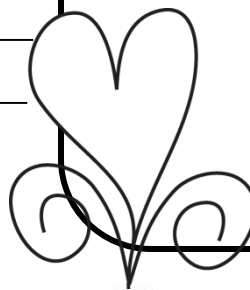

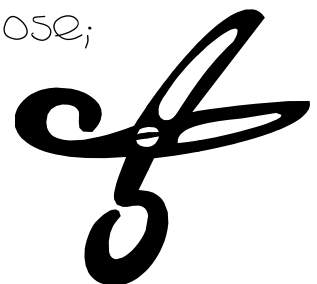



Haiku Poem

A Haiku is a Japanese form of poetry with no rhyme. In it, the author describes an object or scene in exactly seventeen syllables. Haiku poems have three lines, each with a specific number of syllables. Line one has five syllables, line two has seven, and line three has five syllables.

Example:

Waking up to chirps
Birds singing in the morning
Beautiful bird songs

Teacher Note:

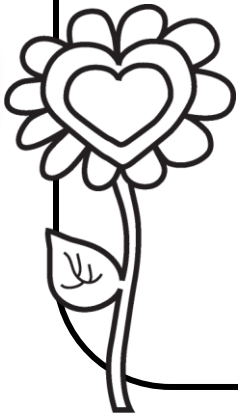
I introduce Haiku Poems by reading the book, Dogku by Andrew Clements. The entire book is written in Haiku. As I read the book aloud I have the students clap out the syllables on each page to be sure every page has the right syllable count. Then, have the students follow the Haiku outline to write about any topic they would like.

CINQUAIN POEM

A Cinquain Poem is a special kind of five-line poem that follows the following format:

Line 1: One Word – A noun

Line 2: Two words describing the noun - Adjectives

Line 3: Three words which tell what the noun does - Verbs

Line 4: Four words expressing feeling

Line 5: A synonym for the noun

Poem

An **Alphabet Alliteration poem** can be an imaginative and silly poem. In alliteration, each important word in the line begins with the same letter. For each letter in the alphabet write three words that follow the following pattern:

First Word: An adjective - that will describe the noun

Second Word: A noun - the subject of your sentence

Third Word: A verb - showing the action of the noun

Example:

2-WORDER POEM

In a 2-Worder Poem each line of the poem consists of only two words. The two words describe the topic of the poem.

Holiday Poem

A Holiday Poem uses words or phrases that go with that holiday. The words and phrases describe that holiday using the 5-Senses. Use the following format to write a poem about your favorite holiday.

Line 1: Name of your chosen holiday

Line 2: Something you SEE during the holiday

Line 3: Something you HEAR during the holiday

Line 4: Something you SMELL during the holiday

Line 5: Something you TASTE during the holiday

Line 6: Something you FEEL during the holiday

Line 7: Repeat holiday name
